FOREWARD

Pursuant to the “Seizure and Forfeiture Reporting Act” (5 ILCS 810/10) all agencies (including but not limited to law enforcement agencies, a drug task force, Metropolitan Enforcement Group (MEG), State’s Attorney office and the Appellate Prosecutor’s office) which receives proceeds from forfeitures subject to reporting under this Act shall file an annual report with the Illinois State Police no later than 60 days after December 31 of that year. The format of the report shall be developed by the Illinois State Police and shall be completed by the law enforcement agency.

The Illinois State Police shall establish and maintain on its official website a public database that includes annual aggregate data for each law enforcement agency that reports seizures of property, which receives distributions of forfeiture proceeds, or reports expenditures subject to reporting under this Act.

This report is a compilation of online submissions by Illinois law enforcement agencies, State’s Attorney’s, multi-jurisdictional taskforces, Illinois State Police (ISP) and the ISP Asset Forfeiture Section (AFS). This year, as required by the Act, 4,704 individual forfeited property records were submitted to the ISP. The content of the records submitted is summarized for brevity in this report.

Of the 454 agencies which submitted reports to the ISP, 336 agencies reported receiving funds from asset forfeiture during this reporting period. More than \$31.2 million in cash was seized and \$19.4 million in cash and property was awarded to law enforcement during this reporting period.

Sec. 2. Legislative Declaration. The General Assembly finds that the civil forfeiture of property which is used or intended to be used in, is attributable to or facilitates the manufacture, sale, transportation, distribution, possession or use of substances in certain violations of the Illinois Controlled Substances Act, the Cannabis Control Act, or the Methamphetamine Control and Community Protection Act will have a significant beneficial effect in deterring the rising incidence of the abuse and trafficking of such substances within this State. While forfeiture may secure for State and local units of government some resources for deterring drug abuse and drug trafficking, forfeiture **is not intended to be an alternative means of funding the administration of criminal justice.** The General Assembly further finds that the federal narcotics civil forfeiture statute upon which this Act is based has been very successful in deterring the use and distribution of controlled substances within this State and throughout the country. It is therefore the intent of the General Assembly that the forfeiture provisions of this Act be construed in light of the federal forfeiture provisions contained in 21 U.S.C. 881 as interpreted by the federal courts, except to the extent that the provisions of this Act expressly differ therefrom.

SCOPE OF THE REPORT

Asset forfeiture reporting submissions were solicited from every unit of government in the state of Illinois which participated in the seizure and or forfeiture process. This was the first all-digital reporting cycle. Therefore, historical data is not included in this report. Moving forward, trends and comparisons will be included in future reports.


Section 3: Awards

For an agency to list funds, personal property or conveyances received from ISP on the 2022 Illinois Seizure and Awarded Assets Annual Report, the agency must have received a check or the signed "RETURN OF FORFEITED PROPERTY REQUEST/AGREEMENT" from the ISP Director during the reporting period. The reporting period was calendar year 2022.

The statutory formula used for the distribution of funds once a forfeiture is granted is as follows:


Statutory Formula (Outside of Cook County):

65% Seizing Agency	12.5% State's Attorney
12.5% Appellate Prosecutor	10% Illinois State Police




Statutory Formula (Cook County):

65% Seizing Agency 25% Cook County State's Attorney 10% Illinois State Police
