#### LAW ENFORCMENT OFFICERS KILLED

During 1998, one Illinois law enforcement officer was feloniously killed in the line of duty. A brief narrative on the circumstances surrounding the death is presented below:

#### **AUGUST 21, 1998 - CHICAGO POLICE DEPARTMENT**

On August 21, 1998, a 26-year-old police officer died from injuries received on August 15, 1998. Officer Michael A. Ceriale and his partner, working in plain clothes, had observed some drug dealing activity. While conducting surveillance, they were spotted by a "look-out" who fired one shot at the officers. The round struck Officer Michael A. Ceriale just under his bulletproof vest.
