LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED

During 1999, two Illinois law enforcement officers were feloniously killed in the line of duty. A brief narrative on the circumstances surrounding their death is presented below:

JANUARY 9, 1999 - CHICAGO POLICE DEPARTMENT

On January 9, 1999, Officer John C. Knight, a 9-year veteran, was killed while on duty. He and his partner were investigating two suspicious persons in a vehicle. Having been spotted by the officers, the suspects fled the scene with both officers in pursuit. After a brief chase, the suspects' vehicle struck a parked auto. The offenders exited their vehicle and one offender drew a weapon, firing at both officers. During the exchange of gunfire, both officers were struck. Officer Knight died as a result of his injuries. He was 38 years old.

MARCH 9, 1999 - CHICAGO POLICE DEPARTMENT

On March 9, 1999, Officer James H. Camp, a 4-year veteran, was killed while on duty. He and his partner observed what appeared to be a stolen auto occupied by two suspicious persons. The driver of the vehicle refused to exit the vehicle when asked, and instead began to struggle with Officer Camp. The offender gained control of Camp's weapon during the struggle and fired. Officer Camp was struck and fatally wounded. Camp was 34 years old and was killed just 3 days prior to his 35th birthday.
