

METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREAS



Metropolitan Statistical Areas

An area qualifies for recognition as an MSA in one of two ways: (1) if it includes a city of at least 50,000 population, or (2) if it includes an urbanized area of at least 50,000 population with a total metropolitan population of at least 100,000. In addition to the county containing the main city or urbanized area, an MSA may include additional counties having strong economic and social ties to the central county. Two of the MSAs overlap with Iowa and Missouri. Areas outside of Illinois that are included in an MSA are not represented in the statistics presented here. In some cases, the percentages may not equal 100 due to rounding. MSAs are defined by the U.S. Bureau of the Census.

MSA Summary

The MSA summary includes MSA Large Municipalities, MSA Small Municipalities and Rural Areas Inside MSAs. The inhabitants of the large and small municipalities and rural areas that comprise the state's MSAs account for 84.6 percent of the state population. The total MSA index crimes account for 90.6 percent of the Illinois Crime Index.

MSA Large Municipalities Summary

These municipalities are cities or "twin municipalities" within an MSA that have more than 50,000 people and exhibit characteristics of a major metropolitan center.

The inhabitants of the large municipalities represent 40.1 percent of the state's population and 47.4 percent of the MSAs' population. The large municipalities account for 60.2 percent of the Illinois index crimes and 66.5 percent of the total MSA index crimes.

MSA Small Municipalities Summary

Small municipalities are suburban areas within an MSA with a population of 50,000 or less.

The inhabitants of small municipalities represent 32.6 percent of the state's population and 38.6 percent of the MSAs' population. Small municipalities account for 25.5 percent of the Illinois index crimes and 28.1 percent of the total MSA index crimes.

Rural Areas Inside MSAs (Sheriffs' Offices)

The rural areas in this section are comprised of the unincorporated population of the counties that are in MSAs. For I-UCR purposes, these rural areas are comprised of the sheriff's jurisdiction within an MSA.

The inhabitants of the rural areas within an MSA represent 11.4 percent of the state's population and 13.5 percent of the MSAs' population. They account for 4.6 percent of the Illinois index crimes and 5.1 percent of the total MSA index crimes.

Rural Areas Outside MSAs (Sheriffs' Offices)

The rural areas in this section are comprised of the unincorporated population of the counties outside the MSAs. For I-UCR purposes, these rural areas are comprised of the sheriff's jurisdiction outside the MSA.

The inhabitants of the rural areas outside MSAs represent 7.2 percent of the state's population. They account for 2.2 percent of the Illinois index crimes.

Other Cities Summary

Other cities are urban places outside the MSAs. For I-UCR purposes, these are cities and towns outside the MSAs and surrounded by rural areas that are not under the jurisdiction of the county sheriffs' offices.

The inhabitants of other cities account for 8.2 percent of the state's population. Other cities account for 7.2 percent of the Illinois index crimes.
