In Memoriam: Inspector Michael Belevedere Cowling

December 25, 1950 - June 14, 2024

Michael Belvedere Cowling, affectionately known as Big shied away from a challenge. Mike, was a man whose laughter was as hearty as his appetite for life.

Born on a snowy Christmas Day in 1950, in the bustling city of Chicago, IL, Michael's larger-than-life presence filled every room he entered until his final curtain call in Bolingbrook, IL, on June 14, 2024, due to heart failure. He was a man who lived his 73 years with the kind of gusto that would make even the most adventurous souls envious.

Michael was a proud graduate of John Marshall High School, class of '68 – a time when bell-bottoms were in, and he was out, tearing up the town. He didn't stop there; he hit the books and showed the kids how it's done by earning a Bachelor of Arts from Governors State University in 2016, proving it's never too late to be a college heartthrob. Professionally, Michael was nothing short of a local legend. He began throwing people over his shoulder as a Judo & Karate Instructor in 1973, which we all know was just his way of hugging people really fast.

In 1977, he traded his black belt for a badge, becoming an Illinois State Trooper. Michael's interests were simple yet profound: barbequing, cracking open a cold beer, and spending time with his family and friends. He believed that the best things in life aren't things at all, but the memories we make with the people we love - preferably over a perfectly grilled steak. In true Michael fashion, he'd want us to leave you with a smile, so here's a quote from the great Robin Williams that he would have loved: "You're only given a little spark of madness. You mustn't lose it." Michael certainly never lost his spark, and his madness was the kind that drew people in and made life a riot.

So, as we say "LATER" to Michael, let's not dwell on the silence left in his wake, but rather fill it with the echoes of his laughter and the warmth of the stories he left us. After all, as he would say, "I'm not here for a long time, I'm here for a good time." And a good time it was. Michael, your final bow may have come, but the applause for the LOVE you brought to our lives will never fade.

Collective Bargaining Agreements: Lodge 41, Teamsters, Command Council

Congratulations to all the labor and management teams for successfully negotiating and ratifying the most recent cycle of collective bargaining agreements.

When I was a kid, way back before Netflix and streaming, the big three broadcast networks would often have movie marathons during the long, hot summer- James Bond, Superman, Star Trek, etc. Not only did these flicks provide a good reason to sit on the couch in the air conditioning, they occasionally taught a few life lessons.

In the classic "Wrath of Khan", Mr. Spock sacrificed himself to save the crew, saying "the needs of the many outweighed the needs of the one." In the sequel, Captain Kirk sacrificed the ship to save Mr. Spock, saying "the needs of the one outweighed the needs of the many."

That's often the toughest challenge with labor negotiations- how to balance the needs of the many and the needs of the one, how to balance the needs of the ISP as an agency and the needs of each individual ISP officer. The ISP has vast, important duties and missions, mandated by the public and the law. The individual officers fulfilling those duties and missions rightly have certain privileges, protections, and benefits enshrined within the law.

Even with the highest level of good faith, finding that balance between the two and putting it into an actual written document can be difficult and hard fought. While there is plenty of give and take in the process, the key is finding those unifying goals that benefit both the agency and the



individual members of the collective bargaining unit.



There is no better example of this than our agreement to increase the overall pay of new troopers. The ISP value of "pride" is not about arrogance, but about the agency being the best we can be, and individual officers being the best they can be. ISP needs more people and those serving in the ISP need more people to help make their job easier and to be more effective. So, we need strong, competitive pay to attract the best, bravest, and brightest to make that happen, now and in the future. From the outset, both sides of the negotiation teams agreed on this wholeheartedly and I am grateful for the results. As the word has gone out about our higher overall starting pay, we are already seeing a greatly expanded pool of qualified applicants from both inside and outside the state.

As with all contract negotiations, both labor and management gave some and got some. But overall there are many great things in the collective bargaining agreements that benefit both the agency and individual members, that benefit "the needs of the many" and "the needs of the one."

Again, my thanks to the negotiating teams, and congratulations to everyone in ISP for an agreement that makes strong investments in the agency and our people, preparing the agency to meet the challenges ahead of us, and undoubtedly helping the ISP live long and prosper.

ISP Issues Third Round of Firearm Enforcement Grants

SPRINGFIELD - The Illinois State Police (ISP) is issu- Funding for the enforcement grants comes from ing the third round of firearm enforcement grants totaling \$1.5 million to law enforcement agencies across the state to conduct enforcement details for individuals legally barred from having a firearm. The enforcement details focus on individuals who have become the subject of a Firearm Restraining Order or Clear and Present Danger, or received a criminal conviction, among other reasons.

"People who have made homicidal or suicidal threats and clearly pose a danger to the public should not have a firearm," said ISP Director Brendan F. Kelly. "These grants can help local law enforcement agencies pay for enforcement details to ensure those who are legally prohibited from having a firearm do not have them in their possession."

The table at right lists the law enforcement agencies receiving Fiscal Year 2025 firearm enforcement grants.

In Fiscal Year 2023, ISP awarded almost \$1 million in firearm enforcement grants to 30 law enforcement agencies across the state. During that time, local law enforcement agencies completed 311 details consisting of 3,557 compliance checks. As a result of these efforts, 1,151 individuals were placed directly into compliance, transferring all firearms out of their possession and documenting that transfer with a Firearm Disposition Record. ISP awarded another \$1 million in grants to 16 law enforcement agencies in Fiscal Year 2024.

Law enforcement agencies that are members of the Violent Crime Intelligence Task Force are eligible to receive grants from the State Police Enforcement Fund. Funding will help agencies conduct firearms enforcement details and ensure firearms are turned over to a person who is legally allowed to possess firearms, or to law enforcement.

Team Illinois Youth Police Camp at Lewis University Garners High Praise





ISP Improves Crash Investigation and Safety Techniques During

Testing and Research Event in Joliet

JOLIET – To help with traffic crash investigations, as well as identify best practices to keep officers safe, the Illinois State Police (ISP) participated in the Illinois Association of Technical Accident Investigators crash testing event on June 26-28, 2024. The event took place at the Route 66 Raceway in Joliet, IL. ISP officers from the Traffic Crash Reconstruction Unit, Crime Scene Services, Division of Patrol, and representatives from the ISP Forensic Laboratory joined law enforcement officers and crash scene investigators from other agencies for the three-day event. Attendees witnessed live crash testing and participated in forensic mapping and digital evidence recovery.

"Opportunities for ISP to participate in events like this are instrumental to our continued success in crash scene reconstruction and digital evidence analysis," said Director Brendan F. Kelly. "Experiences gained in these controlled environments and this level of in-depth training deepens our understanding of



A large focus of the testing was aimed at developing best practices for scene safety management as it pertains to the positioning of responding officer's squad cars upon arrival to a scene. ISP donated multiple older squad cars to the event to evaluate the forces the retired squads received during crash events. This allowed personnel to evaluate how differences in vehicle placement at a scene could lower the amount of force incurred by the squads and how to minimize damage to the vehicle and potentially an officer inside. High-tech, biomechanical crash test dummies were brought in to measure the force a human body would sustain while seated inside a squad car while being struck from behind. The dummies were also tested standing on the side of vehicles, to replicate a trooper's position while outside their vehicle on a traffic stop. Analysis of this data will help ISP and other law enforcement agencies develop ever-evolving best safety practices and improve training for officers.



Officers also had the opportunity to practice and hone their skills of controlling an Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS), also known as drones. ISP routinely uses UAS's when responding to serious injury and fatal crashes to accurately map the scenes and document evidence.

Already in 2024, ISP has suffered 15 Move Over Lawrelated crashes with seven troopers injured. In 2023, ISP had 21 Move Over Law-related crashes with seven troopers injured, and suffered 25 crashes in 2022, leaving 13 troopers injured.

ISP Combats Vehicle Hijacking and Theft

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois State Police (ISP) continues to target vehicle theft, hijacking, and related violent crimes using grant funding from the Illinois Secretary of State Illinois Vehicle Hijacking and Motor Vehicle Theft Prevention and Insurance Verification Council. ISP was awarded a \$10 million grant for the first fiscal year, and another \$677,000 grant announced in June 2024.

"The Illinois State Police uses a multi-pronged approach, including increased patrol, air operations support, investigations, and forensic services to combat vehicle hijackings and thefts," said ISP Director Brendan F. Kelly. "This grant funding will allow ISP to focus additional resources on catching those committing vehicle thefts, hijackings, and other related violent crimes."

From April through June 2024, ISP missions resulted in the following:

Highlights of ISP vehicle recovery efforts:

- April 5, 2024, ISP pursued a stolen Jeep on 57th and Wells in Chicago. The vehicle parked in the area of 88th and Kenwood where the suspects exited the Jeep and entered a Lincoln. The Lincoln fled and crashed near 93rd and Harper where the suspects ran from the vehicle. ISP took two suspects into custody and recovered a stolen firearm.
- May 6, 2024, ISP located a stolen Nissan and attempted a traffic stop at Laramie and Gladys in Chicago, but the Nissan fled. The Nissan parked at 16th and Homan and four suspects ran from the vehicle. ISP took all four suspects into custody and recovered two firearms.
- June 6, 2024, ISP located a stolen Dodge on I-94 at 71st. Troopers attempted a traffic stop, but the Dodge fled. The Dodge stopped in the area of 50th and Morgan and ISP took two suspects into custody.

ISP Arrests Alsip Man for Murder

CHICAGO - Illinois State Police (ISP) Division of Criminal Investigation Zone 1 arrested 44-year-old Lloyd Wickliffe of Alsip for Attempted Murder (Class X Felony).



On July 7, 2024, at approximately 5:58 a.m., ISP received a call of an expressway shooting that occurred on Interstate 57 southbound 115th Street, Chicago. The preliminary investigation revealed that the victim vehicle was shot at by a suspect in a Chevrolet

Impala. No injuries were reported.

After an extensive ISP investigation, the suspect and vehicle were identified. ISP presented the case to the Cook County State's Attorney's Office and the above-mentioned charge was filed. No further information is available.

The Number of Chicago Area Expressway Shootings Down for 3rd Straight Year

CHICAGO – For the third year, the Illinois State Police (ISP) is reporting a decrease in the number of shootings on Chicago area expressways. At the midway mark for 2024, ISP is reporting a 36% decrease in the total number of Chicago area expressway shootings compared to this time last year. When compared to 2021, we've seen a 65% reduction in shootings. The number of non-fatal injury expressway shooting in the Chicago area is down 47% compared to this time in 2023.

"Year after year, we have seen a decrease in the number of Chicago area expressway shootings," said ISP Director Brendan F. Kelly. "This year's reduction, on top of the decreases we've seen over the last two years, shows our tactics to reduce violence on the expressway are having an effect. ISP will continue to dedicate the resources needed to help keep the public safe."

After the number of expressway shootings reached an all-time high in 2021, ISP implemented a multi-faceted approach to reducing expressway shooting, including increased patrols, the creation of Special Operation Groups focused on strategic violent crime reduction missions, the use of automated license plate readers, increased Air Operations, intensive investigations, and enhanced forensic services.

Part of stopping crime includes solving crime and ISP Division of Criminal Investigation special agents aggressively pursue all leads in expressway shootings. In one instance, special agents began an investigation following an expressway shooting stemming from a road rage incident in early June. Agents conducted numerous interviews and reviewed license plate reader photos, which led to the identification of the vehicle and possible suspects. During the investigation, agents obtained several search warrants, conducted surveillance, and collected evidence. Within two days of the shooting, the investigation resulted in one person being charged with two counts of attempted murder, and another being charged with Aggravated Fleeing to Elude and three counts of Aggravated Unlawful Use of a Weapon. This is just one example of the extensive and thorough investigations ISP special agents conduct to get violent criminals off the expressways.

In its ongoing mission to reduce expressway shootings, ISP is faced with several challenges. Victims and witness increasingly are reporting road rage was involved in expressway shootings. ISP's approach to reducing expressway violence will continue to evolve as we address new challenges and implement successful strategies.

28-Year-Old Danville Man Pleads Guilty to Possession of Child Pornography



On June 10, 2024, Daniel Richards, formerly of Danville, Illinois, was sentenced to 9 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections following a contested sentencing hearing. Richards pleaded guilty on April 15, 2024, to three counts of Possession of Child Pornography, all class 2 felonies. Richards will serve a term of 1-year mandatory supervised release.

Judge Robert McIntire heard evidence that the Illinois State Police received a tip from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children about an Illinois resident who had uploaded child pornography to the internet. Working with the Attorney General's Office and Vermilion County Authorities, the Illinois State Police made contact with this defendant, Daniel Richards. Investigators uncovered more evidence, and obtained a confession from Richards, that he had possessed and exchanged multiple images and videos of child pornography.

State's Attorney Jacqueline Lacy said, "The rapid response and thorough investigation by the Illinois State Police led to a successful prosecution in this case. Child pornography is a serious crime and puts the children depicted in the images in grave danger."

Trooper Michael T. Angelos

End of Watch July 13, 1960

Trooper Michael T. Angelos was killed in an automobile accident.

Nearing the end of his eight -hour shift, Trooper Angelos was pursuing a speeding car on Roosevelt Road near Elmhurst. Trooper Angelos pulled into the left lane to pass an eastbound vehicle. He was sideswiped by a westbound car and was knocked into the vehicle he was attempting to pass. Trooper Angelos was transported to Elmhurst Hospital where he succumbed to his injuries one hour later. The drivers of the other vehicles suffered injuries and survived.

Trooper Angelos was a U.S Navy veteran of WWII and had served with the Illinois State Police for four years and was assigned to District Chicago.




